**RE: Pulse Asia Research’s June 2024 Nationwide Survey on the Performance and Trustworthiness Ratings of the Top Philippine Government Officials**

---

Pulse Asia Research, Inc. is pleased to share some findings on the *Performance and Trustworthiness Ratings of the Top Philippine Government Officials* from the June 2024 *Ulat ng Bayan* national survey. We request that you assist us in informing the public by disseminating this information.

The survey fieldwork was conducted from **June 17 to 24, 2024** using face-to-face interviews. This nationwide survey is based on a sample of 2,400 representative adults 18 years old and above. It has a  $\pm 2\%$  error margin at the 95% confidence level. Subnational estimates for each of the geographic areas covered in the survey (i.e., Metro Manila, the rest of Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao) have a  $\pm 4\%$  error margin, also at 95% confidence level. The following are some of the key developments that took place immediately prior to and during the conduct of the interviews for the June 2024 *Ulat ng Bayan* survey:

1. On 19 June 2024, the Vice-President announced her irrevocable resignation as head of the Department of Education (DepEd) and as co-vice-chairperson of the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-ELCAC). The latter’s departure from the President’s Cabinet signals the end of their political alliance that was forged during the May 2022 elections, with some of her allies even referring to her as the “new leader of the opposition”. For her part, ex-Senator Leila de Lima, who was cleared of the last of the drug cases filed against her on 24 June 2024 and now serves as the Liberal Party (LP) spokesperson, said “the real opposition gives priority to the people and is founded on transparency, accountability, and concern for the citizens”, and none of these can be seen in the Vice-President’s track record.

2. Senator Francis Escudero took over the post of Senate President from Senator Juan Miguel Zubiri on 20 May 2024. In an interview with Senate reporters a few days after the leadership turnover, Senate President Escudero admitted that he alone instigated the move to replace then Senate President Zubiri and that neither those in Malacañang nor their counterparts in the House of Representatives had anything to do with the coup in the Upper House.
3. The suspension of Bamban Mayor Alice Guo and two (2) others for up to 60 days as ordered by the Office of the Ombudsman based on graft charges filed against them by the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) in connection with the operation of illegal Philippine Offshore Gaming Operators (POGOs) in Bamban, Tarlac. During the Senate investigation into the operations of these POGOs, the issue concerning the citizenship of the Bamban Mayor came to light, with evidence showing that she is not a Filipino citizen but is, rather, a Chinese citizen. The latter has also been expelled by the Nationalist People's Coalition (NPC) due to her alleged involvement in illegal offshore gaming operations in her territorial jurisdiction. Furthermore, the Philippine National Police Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (PNP-CIDG) and the Presidential anti-Organized Crime Commission (PAOCC) have filed human trafficking charges against the Bamban Mayor arising from her reported ties to illegal POGOs in her municipality.
4. On 17 June 2024, members of the China Coast Guard and sailors from the Philippine Navy were involved in a confrontation, with the former using lethal weapons, tear gas, and physical violence against the latter who were on a resupply mission to the Ayungin Shoal. However, Malacañang said it does not agree with the military's assessment of the incident but considers it a "misunderstanding or accident" and not an "armed attack".

Amidst this recent violent incident in the West Philippine Sea (WPS), the President said the Philippines will continue to assert its rights over its territorial waters but it will not instigate a war against China. Rather, the country will continue to exhaust peaceful and diplomatic measures to resolve the conflict in the region. Meanwhile, the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) once again called on China to abide by the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) and the 2016 Arbitral Ruling.

5. Executive Order (EO) 62, which reduces the tariff on imported rice from 35% to 15% until 2028, was signed by Executive Secretary Lucas Bersamin by authority of the President on 20 June 2024. Through this measure, Malacañang hopes to lower the price of rice to ₱ 29 per kilo. The Department of Agriculture (DA) plans to import 363,695 metric tons of rice to be able to offer good quality rice to the public at the price of ₱ 29 per kilo beginning in July 2024. In reaction, farmers' groups say they intend not only to file a temporary restraining order (TRO) before the Supreme Court to prevent the implementation of the EO but also to file graft charges against National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Secretary Arsenio Balisacan as well as officials from the Tariff Commission.

Meanwhile, the National Food Authority (NFA) reported that it has surpassed its palay procurement target for the period January 2024 to June 2024 due to its implementation of higher buying prices for palay. As such, the country's total palay inventory stands at 168,262

metric tons as of mid-January 2024, an amount enough to cover four (4) days of national consumption in the event of an emergency or disaster.

6. Another EO issued by the President during this period has to do with the inclusion of the singing of the “*Bagong Pilipinas*” hymn and reciting of the “*Bagong Pilipinas*” pledge during the weekly flag ceremonies conducted by all government entities, including educational institutions. In a related development, the President approved the return to the old academic calendar for public schools, with classes during School Year (SY) 2024-2025 scheduled to commence on 29 July 2024 and end on 15 April 2025. This change was implemented amidst widespread complaints from teachers and students alike regarding the extreme heat during the dry season.
7. Among the other developments during this period are the entry into the country of the COVID-19 FLiRT variant; the appeal on the part of employers’ groups to delay for a year the implementation of the 35-peso increase in the minimum wage in Metro Manila that will take effect on 17 July 2024; the signing of the Negros Island Region (NIR) Act that brings together the provinces of Negros Occidental, Negros Oriental, and Siquijor in order to promote decentralization and strengthen local autonomy; the suspension for six (6) months of Bohol Governor Erico Aristotle Aumentado and 68 other public officials in the aftermath of the construction and operation of a resort within the area where the Chocolate Hills are located; the transmittal to the Senate of House Bill (HB) 9349 or the Absolute Divorce bill; the release from house arrest in Timor Leste of former Negros Oriental Representative Arnolfo Teves Jr.; the failure of the National Telecommunications Commission (NTC) to curb text scams despite the implementation of the SIM Registration Act of 1922; the resignation of two (2) members of the Monetary Board due to their alleged involvement in the hiring of “ghost employees”; the slight increase in the inflation rate to 3.9% in May 2024 from 3.8% in April 2024 to 3.9% in May 2024, the highest in six (6) months, due primarily to the increase in the index of housing, water, electricity, and others fuels; the decline in the electric bill of Manila Electric Company (Meralco) customers; the continued depreciation in the value of the local currency versus the American dollar; and the increase in oil prices in the third week of June 2024.

**Pulse Asia Research’s June 2024 *Ulat ng Bayan* Survey:  
Media Release on the Performance and Trustworthiness Ratings of the

**While the President and the Vice-President obtain majority approval scores in June 2024 (53% and 69%, respectively), indecision is the plurality sentiment toward the quarterly performance of the House Speaker; several marked movements in these officials’ performance ratings occur between March 2024 and June 2024<sup>1</sup>**

Appreciation continues to be the prevailing sentiment toward the work done by the President (53%) and the Vice-President (69%). Meanwhile, a big plurality of Filipino adults (45%) are unable to say if they approve or disapprove of House Speaker Ferdinand Martin G. Romualdez’s performance in the previous quarter (45%). Levels of disapproval for these selected government officials’ work range from 9% for the Vice-President to 21% for the House Speaker. *(Please refer to Table 1.)*

<sup>1</sup> Senate President Francis Joseph G. Escudero is not included in the performance probe because he was elected to the post only on 20 May 2024, less than a month before the fieldwork for the June 2024 *Ulat ng Bayan* survey commenced. The performance probe asks survey respondents to assess the work done by selected government officials in the previous quarter. This is the reason why the incumbent Senate President’s performance is not evaluated by survey respondents in June 2024. The latter is, however, included in the trustworthiness probe since the question included in the *Ulat ng Bayan* survey does not refer to any specific time frame unlike the performance probe.

Of these leading government officials, only the Vice-President enjoys majority approval figures in each geographic area and socio-economic class (54% to 95% and 57% to 82%, respectively). In the case of the President, he records majority approval ratings in Metro Manila (61%), the rest of Luzon (57%), the Visayas (56%), Class D (53%), and Class E (52%). However, a three-way split may be observed in Mindanao, with 38% being appreciative of the latter’s work, 34% expressing indecision on the matter, and 28% criticizing presidential performance. As for House Speaker Romualdez, his only majority approval rating is granted by Visayans (59%). Ambivalence toward the latter’s performance is the plurality sentiment in Metro Manila (46%), the rest of Luzon (48%), Mindanao (48%), and Class D (46%). Those is Class ABC are divided, with 38% being undecided regarding the lawmaker’s work, 34% having a positive assessment, and 27% being critical of the same. In Class E, House Speaker Romualdez records essentially the same approval and indecision figures (41% versus 40%).

At the national level, public opinion about the quarterly performance of these government officials hardly changes between March 2024 and June 2024. However, some movements occur across geographic and socio-economic subgroupings. The President’s approval rating goes up in Metro Manila during this period (+14 percentage points). Similarly, the Vice-President experiences improvements in her approval scores in Metro Manila (+12 percentage points), the Visayas (+16 percentage points), and Class E (+17 percentage points). From March 2024 to June 2024, approval for the work of House Speaker Romualdez becomes more pronounced in the Visayas (+26 percentage points) and Class E (+21 percentage points). On the other hand, the legislator's disapproval scores decline in the Visayas (-18 percentage points), Mindanao (-12 percentage points), and Class E (-17 percentage points). In addition, ambivalence toward the latter's performance becomes more notable among Mindanawons (+12 percentage points).

**Trust is the predominant sentiment toward most of the country’s leading government officials in June 2024; only the President and the House Speaker experiences significant changes in their trustworthiness ratings from March 2024 to June 2024**

Small to big majority trust ratings are enjoyed by the President (52%), the Vice-President (71%), and Senate President Francis Joseph G. Escudero (69%) in June 2024. Like his quarterly performance, the plurality opinion regarding the trustworthiness of House Speaker Romualdez is one of indecision (42%). Regarding distrust, it is more pronounced toward the President and the House Speaker (21% and 23%, respectively) than the Senate President and the Vice-President (5% and 8%, respectively). Both the Vice-President and the Senate President have majority trust ratings in each geographic area (56% to 95% and 64% to 75%, respectively) and socio-economic class (59% to 80% and 63% to 74%, respectively). The President registers majority trust scores in Metro Manila (59%), the rest of Luzon (58%), the Visayas (54%), and Class D (53%) while near majority figures are posted in Class ABC (50%) and Class E (48%). Mindanawons are divided in their assessment of presidential trustworthiness, with 35% trusting him, 33% being unable to say if they trust or distrust him, and 32% expressing distrust in him. House Speaker Romualdez’s only majority trust figure is recorded in the Visayas (57%). Ambivalence is the predominant sentiment regarding the latter’s trustworthiness among those in the rest of Luzon (45%), Mindanao (45%), and Class D (44%). Basically the same trust and indecision ratings are posted in Metro Manila (37% versus 42%) and Class E (40% versus 38%). As for those belonging to Class ABC, they are split three (3) ways, with 36% trusting the House Speaker, 36% expressing indecision on the matter of trusting or distrusting him, and 28% being distrustful of him.

Public opinion regarding the trustworthiness of the Vice-President is basically constant between March 2024 and June 2024. No comparative data are available for the Senate President during this period. The only changes experienced by the President during the said period are the increase in the level of distrust in him at the national level (+6 percentage points) and the rest of Luzon (+13 percentage points). (Please refer to Table 6.)

Trust in House Speaker Romualdez becomes more pronounced among Visayans (+30 percentage points) and those in Class E (+18 percentage points) while distrust becomes more notable in the rest of Luzon (+12 percentage points) but eases in Mindanao (-18 percentage points). In terms of levels of indecision toward the lawmaker’s trustworthiness, there is an increase in Mindanao (+17 percentage points) and a decline in the Visayas (-22 percentage points).
