RE: Pulse Asia Research's January 2025 Nationwide Survey
on the May 2025 Elections

Pulse Asia Research, Inc. is pleased to share some findings on the *May 2025 Elections* from the January 2025 *Pulso ng Bayan Pre-Electoral* national survey. We request that you assist us in informing the public by disseminating this information.

The survey fieldwork was conducted from **January 18 to 25, 2025** using face-to-face interviews. This nationwide survey is based on a sample of 2,400 representative adults 18 years old and above. It has a $\pm 2\%$ error margin at the 95% confidence level. Subnational estimates for each of the geographic areas covered in the survey (i.e., Metro Manila, the rest of Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao) have a $\pm 6\%$ error margin for Metro Manila, $\pm 3\%$ for the rest of Luzon, $\pm 4\%$ for both Visayas and Mindanao, also at 95% confidence level. The following are some of the key developments that took place in the weeks immediately prior to and during the conduct of the survey interviews:

1. The President signed the 2025 General Appropriations Act (GAA) on 30 December 2024. The national budget was initially set at ₱ 6.352 trillion but was reduced to ₱ 6.326 trillion after the President vetoed some line items that, according to Malacañang, were not aligned with the administration's priority programs.
2. A third impeachment complaint against the Vice-President was filed on 19 December 2024. The complaint was filed by a group of Catholic priests, lawyers from Mindanao, and leaders of various civic and laity organizations. Similar to the first two (2) complaints that have been submitted to the House of Representatives, the third one accuses the Vice-President of culpable violation of the 1987 Philippine Constitution, betrayal of public trust, plunder, bribery, graft and corruption, and other high crimes.

For his part, the President reiterated that he is opposed to any efforts to impeach the Vice-President because these will not benefit the Filipino people. The Iglesia ni Cristo (INC)

held a national peace rally on 13 January 2025 not only to express support for the President's stand on the impeachment issue but also to call on government leaders to give priority to addressing the problems affecting Filipinos daily.

3. Following the recommendation of the Lower House's Quad Committee to charge former President Rodrigo R. Duterte and other individuals with crimes against humanity in connection with his administration's "war on drugs", the incumbent President said he will leave it up to the Department of Justice (DOJ) to handle the matter. For their part, Senators Christopher Go and Ronald dela Rosa said they are prepared to face whatever charges may be filed against them in the courts even as they criticized the House Quad Committee's investigation into the previous administration's anti-illegal drugs campaign. In a related development, Executive Secretary Lucas Bersamin said although the Philippines is no longer a member of the ICC, the current administration will "respond favorably or positively" should the Interpol request the arrest of individuals facing trial before the International Criminal Court (ICC).

Meanwhile, the ex-President is also facing a disbarment case filed by a human rights group, several human rights advocates and religious leaders, and relatives of victims of extrajudicial killings (EJKs). The complaint is based on charges that former President Duterte violated the Code of Professional Responsibility and Accountability and conducted himself in a manner unbecoming of a lawyer.

4. The President, through Executive Order (EO) No. 81 signed on 30 December 2024, reorganized the National Security Council (NSC) by removing the Vice-President and former Philippine presidents from its members. Executive Secretary Lucas Bersamin explained that the Vice-President was removed from the council since she is not seen as being "relevant to the responsibilities of membership in the NSC".
5. The official election period began on 12 January 2025 with the implementation of a nationwide gun ban that will be effective until 11 June 2025. Meanwhile, because of several temporary restraining orders (TROs) against the Commission on Elections (COMELEC) that were issued by the Supreme Court, the poll body had to defer the printing of the ballots for the May 2025 elections twice. Nonetheless, despite these developments, the COMELEC expressed confidence that it will be able to meet the deadline for the printing of 73 million official ballots, which is on 14 April 2025.

In connection with the May 2025 polls, the COMELEC exempted 28 programs and services being implemented by the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) from the spending ban to ensure that assistance will continue to be distributed to those in need. However, the COMELEC warned candidates that they can be disqualified if they show up or their campaign materials are displayed in any areas where government aid is being distributed.

6. The DOJ has recommended the filing of 62 counts of money laundering against former Bamban Mayor Alice Guo in connection with allegations of criminal activities being conducted within the premises of the Baofu compound with her jurisdiction. Prior to this, the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) filed complaints of falsification and violations

of the Anti-Dummy Law against the latter and several members of her family. These complaints are related to their purchase of parcels of land in Pangasinan.

7. With the end of the operations of Philippine Offshore Gaming Operators (POGOs) on 31 December 2025, the Office of the Solicitor General (OSG) will now shift its attention to the cancellation of fraudulent birth certificates issued to foreign nationals employed in POGOs and the seizure of any of their properties illegally acquired in the Philippines. Meanwhile, the Bureau of Immigration (BI) is looking for about 11,000 POGO employees who continue to remain in the country illegally.
8. The Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) has reported the continued presence of the China Coast Guard (CCG) in the West Philippine Sea (WPS), specifically in the vicinity of the Panatag or Scarborough Shoal. On 17-18 January 2025, the Philippines and the United States (US) carried out joint air and sea patrols off Palawan in a show of cooperation. The new US administration has assured the Philippines of its “ironclad” commitment in the face of continued Chinese aggression in the region.
9. Upon his return to the White House, US President Donald Trump signed several EOs that included ending birthright citizenship, the US exiting from the World Health Organization (WHO) and withdrawing from the 2015 Paris climate agreement, declaring a border emergency in the southern US, and issuing pardons for offenders and commutations in relation to the 06 January 2021 attack on the Capitol.
10. A ceasefire agreement between Israel and Hamas took effect on 19 January 2025 following its approval by the Israeli cabinet two days prior. The first phase of the deal, which will last for six (6) weeks, will involve the release of 735 Palestinian prisoners, the withdrawal of Israeli forces from Gaza, and the release of some Israeli hostages. Also involved in negotiating the ceasefire deal were representatives from the governments of the US, Qatar, and Egypt.
11. The Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) reported that the inflation rate for December 2024 was recorded at 2.9% - higher than the 2.5% figure the month before. This was due primarily to the rise in the cost of housing, water, electricity, gas, and other fuels. In the meantime, the new year opened with a series of oil price hikes, with a big-time increase taking effect on 21 January 2025. Gasoline prices went up by as much as ₱ 1.60/liter, diesel by ₱ 2.60/liter, and kerosene by ₱ 2.50/liter.

Half of Filipino registered voters (50%) already have a complete senatorial slate for the coming elections; ACT-CIS Party-List Representative Erwin Tulfo enjoys solo 1st place (62.8%)

With about four (4) months to go before the May 2025 senatorial election, a near majority of Filipino registered voters inclined to vote in the coming polls and those undecided about casting their ballot in May 2025 (hereinafter referred to as registered voters) are naming 12 of their preferred senatorial candidates (50%). Small to huge majorities in the Visayas (64%), Mindanao (72%), and Class E (52%) have a complete slate for the May 2025 senatorial election. In contrast, only about a third of those in the rest of Luzon (33%) have expressed support for 12 candidates for the Senate (out of a maximum of 12). *(Please refer to Table 1.)*

Overall, registered voters are identifying a mean of 9 and a median of 11 of the senatorial bets they are inclined to support in May 2025. Across geographic areas and socio-economic classes, mean figures vary from 7 to 11 while median figures range from 8 to 12.

Of the 66 senatorial candidates running in the coming elections, 14 would have a statistical chance of winning if the May 2025 polls were held during the survey period. Apart from Mr. Ben Tulfo and Mr. Willie Revillame, all the probable winners are either incumbent or former members of Congress. Furthermore, 10 of those with a statistical chance of winning are running under the national administration's "Alyansa Para sa Bagong Pilipinas".

Currently in the lead is ACT-CIS Party-List Representative Erwin Tulfo, whose overall voter preference of 62.8% translates to a statistical ranking of solo 1st place. Occupying 2nd-3rd places is Senator Christopher Go (50.4%) while close behind him is former Senate President Vicente Sotto III (50.2%, 2nd-4th places). Mr. Ben Tulfo finds himself in 3rd-8th places (46.2%). Sharing 4th-8th places are Senator Pia Cayetano (46.1%) and Senator Ramon Revilla Jr. (46.0%) while Senator Imee Marcos (43.4%) and former Senator Panfilo Lacson (42.4%) both have a statistical ranking of 4th-12th places. *(Please refer to Table 2.)*

Completing the list of probable winners are: (1) Mr. Willie Revillame (41.9%, 7th-13th places); (2) Senator Ronald dela Rosa (41.2%, 7th-14th places); (3) Makati City Mayor Marlen Abigail Binay (41.1%, 7th-14th places); (4) former Senator Emmanuel Pacquiao (40.6%, 7th-14th places); (5) Las Piñas Representative Camille Villar (38.4%, 9th-14th places); and (6) Senator Manuel Lapid (37.7%, 10th-14th places).

Indecision as regards their senatorial choices is expressed by 3.1% of registered voters. The rest of the country's registered voters either do not have any preferred senatorial candidates (2.5%) or refuse to say whom they are voting for in the May 2025 senatorial election (1.7%).

Awareness of the party-list system at the national level is recorded at 79%; out of the 155 groups seeking a congressional seat through the party-list system, only five (5) succeed in securing the maximum number of seats allowed under the system, which is three (3)

A big majority of the electorate (79%) reports awareness of the party-list system. Majority levels of awareness across geographic areas range from 68% in the Visayas to 98% in Mindanao while essentially the same awareness figures are posted in the different classes (75% to 80%). Under the party-list system, a winning party can win at most three (3) congressional seats. Among the 155 party-list groups running in the May 2025 polls, only five (5) have a chance of securing the maximum number of seats for the party-list election. These are the ACT-CIS (7.96%), 4Ps (7.42%), Tingog (6.29%), Uswag Ilonggo (4.83%), and Senior Citizens (4.44%). Meanwhile, those with two (2) congressional seats are Ako Bicol (3.32%), PPP (2.52%), Malasakit@Bayanihan (2.46%), Asenso Pinoy (2.44%), Duterte Youth (2.38%), Agimat (2.06%), and Gabriela (2.06%). (Please refer to Table 4.)

The party-list groups with a seat each are: (1) Abang Lingkod (1.84%); (2) ACT Teachers (1.72%); (3) 1-Rider Party-List (1.63%); (4) 1Pacman (1.61%); (5) TUCP (1.47%); (6) United Senior Citizens (1.45%); (7) ALONA (1.36%); (8) PINUNO (1.34%); (9) Bayan Muna (1.29%); (10) PBBM (1.19%); (11) Ako Ilocano Ako (1.12%); (12) PhilRECA (1.08%); (13) Batang Quiapo (1.07%); (14) CIBAC (1.06%); (15) Magsasaka (1.06%); (16) Hugpong Federal (1.06%); (17) Trabaho (1.01%); (18) TUPAD (1.00%); (19) AGAP (0.97%); (20) Kabataan (0.87%); (21) 1Tahanan (0.85%); (22) Ang Probinsiyano (0.77%); (23) Damayang Filipino (0.72%); (24) CWS (0.71%); (25) Kalinga (0.70%); (26) Buhay (0.69%); (27) FPJ Panday Bayanihan (0.68%); (28) 4K (0.67%); (29) Nanay (0.67%); (30) SBP (0.65%); (31) AKO Bisaya (0.64%); (32) Coop-NATCCO (0.63%); (33) Murang Kuryente (0.62%); and (34) Ako-OFW (0.62%).

Non-support for any of the party-list groups participating in the May 2025 elections is expressed by 16% of Filipino registered voters.
